The University ensures optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep of different facilities by holding regular meetings of committees constituted for this purpose. The procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and sport facilities are available in the form of SOPs and the same are briefed to the students during the orientation programme at the beginning of the academic year for every batches of students. The University has policy to calibrate, repair and maintain the sophisticated lab equipments to be done by the manufacturers / vendors. The microscopes used for various experiments are cleaned and maintained by the concerned departments and record of maintenance are also maintained by lab technicians, supervised by HODs of the concerned departments. Students' handbook that is handed over to the students at the beginning of the year serves as a comprehensive guide to all academic and support facilities offered by the Institution. At the end of every year, review of all properties is done in the form of audit of the respective department. Recommendations from the IQAC for quality improvement are forwarded to the Board of Studies to take up the CBCS and to offer Elective subjects for the courses offered by the University. The University charges only the approved fee from the students and provision to pay their fee through online or any digital form is made.

1. Title of the Practice Tobacco Cessation Centre, Tobacco Free Campus 2. Goal The Institution aims at community service by aiding persons wishing to quit smoking or chewing tobacco and tobacco containing products. 3. The Context In the present era, smoking and chewing tobacco is almost considered to be the routine and fashion among the youngsters and also among the oldages too, and as

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a consequence, many a noncommunicable diseases like cancer, diabetes, chronic
    respiratory diseases and a lot more results because of such ill habits.
 Considering the locale of the University, the trend appeared to be even worse
and the University in order to minimise and to really help the community to get
 away from such habits, the Tobacco cessation centre by the Univrsity has been
 started during the current year. 4. The Practice The Tobacco Cessation Centre
 is a special service run by the Santosh Dental College since 7th January 2019
in order to aid persons wishing to quit smoking or chewing tobacco and tobacco
containing products. The clinic is held on all Mondays in the Dental college in
   the Department of Public Health Dentistry. Dr. Priyanka Bhushan Associate
Professor, Public Health Dentistry is the faculty incharge. Interns on rotation
 basis are posted in the tobacco cessation clinic who counsel the patients or
 the persons accompanying them regarding the ill effects of tobacco and advise
appropriate strategies to quit use of Tobacco which is usually a combination of
   medicines such as nicotine gum, patch and inhaler to reduce the urge and
  craving for nicotine as well as behavioral strategies for tobacco cessation
      counseling such as 5A's and 5R's to help which aids in quitting the
habit.Patients undergo a detailed evaluation and history, which focuses on the
 severity of the tobacco addiction ,use and the motivation to quit. Health talk
  is given by the posted interns with the help of audio visual aids such as
  posters and power points on various forms of tobacco and its ill effects,
precancerous lesion and its condition. Patients record is maintained with their
  name, address, phone no, and their consumption and habit pattern. Patient
 Feedback is also recorded. Patients write their reviews and give suggestions
which aid the college in its scope for beter practices. 5. Evidence of Success
   Patients who come from OPD are recalled for weekly, biweekly and monthly
 protocols. Each time patient feedback is taken to analyze patients commitment
   towards tobacco cessation habit. Focus is on family counseling and it is
 ensured that some family member accompanied to reinforce the strategy and to
   enable us get true feedback about patients claim to have left the habit.
 Currently we are having a success rate of 55 (6 months) in this aspect. More
strategies including rewards are being contemplated to increase the success of
tobacco cessation. 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required a. Patient's
sagging motivation: Patients' motivation levels fluctuate. It is even possible
 for patients to start reconsidering their decision to quit, as their initial
  enthusiasm wears off and they face the discomfort of acute withdrawals and
 craving. This further emphasizes the need for continued followup. b. Loss of
Wages: People reporting to the tobacco counselling centre miss out their daily
wages or loss of salary for the day so many patients are unwilling to listen to
 or give time. c. Relapse tendency: Relapse is a cause of burnout among health
  professionals dealing with patients dependent on tobacco or other tobacco
      substances. It is a human tendency to expect some results from the
 intervention. And it is difficult to go through the whole intervention again
  with the next patient when the previous patient has already started using
    substances soon after the consultation. Best Practice 2 1. Title of the
Practice Passion towards new technologies with vision towards super speciality
Hospital 2. Goal The Santosh Deemed to be University teaching hospital aims at
 offering excellent community service by reaching the unreached. The vision of
  the university is by and large clear to incorporate latest technologies for
  optimum patient care system in the teaching hospital. 3. The Context As the
  population grows, the varieties of diseases too grow equally and even more.
     This requires, various high tech instrumentations for investigations,
assessment and researches pertaining to the infections. It is not the same way
   treatment is being offered as being done a couple of decades ago. Due to
   advancement of technological equipments and advancement in research more
   accurate ways of treatment are expected by the community. 4. The Practice
Santosh Deemed to be University has a vision to offer quality treatment to the
  patients to aid the social wellbeing of the human community. The teaching
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hospital has improved infrastructure and major upgradation has been done in OPD, ICU Wards, Emergency services, labour room etc. The teaching hospital has a 7 bedded triage with latest equipments like Maquet Servo Ventilators, Central Oxygen suction hangers, Defibrillators, Crash carts etc., supported by 24X7 consultant team. The teaching hospital also has 23 bedded state of art trauma centre equipped with Maquet Servo Ventilators, Monitors, Defibrillators, ECG machines, Emergency operation theatres and 500 M/A Xray machine in it. The hospital also has Automated Tissue Processor, Roche Immunology Analyzer ImmunoBiochemistry fully automated equipment which can cater to 240 samples / hour, Siemens ABG machines are installed in the Trauma Centre and ICU, Latest Phaco Machine, CT Scan, MRI Scan, VaTech OPG machine, etc. has been installed in the hospital. The hospital also plans to install a CATHLAB for learning and research. 5. Evidence of Success The evidence of success has been felt in the number of patients visiting the hospital and the average number of bed occupancy which is almost 81 this academic year serves as the evidence of success for the above efforts. The patients altogether get a feel of getting treated in corporate hospitals, which shall be evident from the patient feedbacks obtained and analysed. 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required Adequate Financial resource for installation of such high end equipments and creation of laboratory infrastructure has been a challenge, but has been successfully overcome by the teaching hospital.
